- 3. We are truly REALTIONAL beings, made for deep integrated living
 - a. For connection with God, ourselves, and others
 - b. And ever since mankind's rebellion in the Garden, we're instead become broken and disintegrated
 - c. But GOD is hard at work to heal and restore, to reconnect us not only to himself, but to ourselves, and one another
 - i. So we can live as we were meant to!
 - ii. Because he loves us
 - iii. More than any of us fully know or understand
- 4. Today we're excited to wrap up and kind of bring all these together by talking about RELATING FOR LIFE
 - a. Relating well in every area of our life IN LIGHT OF our life, death, and hope of Resurrection through JC
- 5. We're also pumped to have a special guest tonight who will help us as we consider Relating for Life
 - a. More on that in a minute
- 6. The oldest Psalm is most likely Psalm 90, written by Moses about 3500 years ago.
 - a. In verse 10 he writes: Our days may come to seventy years,
 - or eighty, if our strength endures;
 - i. Jeanne Calment, oldest confirmed human, died 1997 at age 122
 - ii. But the average lifespan is still right there in the 80 year range.
 - b. Then in verse 12, in light of that, he asks God to:
 - -- Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom.
- 7. The HEART of wisdom (not just knowing FACTS, but knowing HOW TO LIVE and RELATE WELL) includes NECESSARILY understanding the reality of our life:
 - a. it's boundedness. Finiteness. 70-80 years
- 8. In our culture, we don't like to think much about our mortality
 - a. But the reality is, none of us are getting out of here alive
 - i. There are only 2 sure things in life, death and taxes
 - ii. And we avoid BOTH like the plague
 - b. In fact, studies show that contemplating and discussing death, numbering our days, makes us:
 - i. Less afraid of death
 - ii. Less defensiveness of our worldview

- iii. More generous
- iv. More kind
- v. More loving
- vi. Higher value on human life
- vii. Higher value on relationships

- 9. Maybe that's why God's Word speaks frequently about life and death, and encourages us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom
- 10. Because, no matter what you believe about life after death, it completely affects HOW YOU LIVE NOW
 - a. If there's no afterlife, or if there's no connect or continuity between this life and the next, then we should live for self NOW
 - i. Eat, drink and be merry for tomorrow you die
 - b. But if, IF, there's an offer of life after death, and if that life is intimately connected with how we live now, then there's nothing MORE IMPORTANT
- 11. Today to help us think and talk about these things, we're privileged to have with us my wife's grandfather, Al Lyle
 - a. Come on up
 - b. Interview
 - i. Al, how old will you be in January, your next birthday?
 - 1. 96
 - ii. Tell us a little about yourself
 - 1. You're Jenn Geldart's grandfather
 - 2. When and where were you born?
 - 3. What was it like when you were a boy
 - 4. How many girls did you date?
 - iii. When did you decide to follow Jesus?
 - 1. What drew you to Him?
 - iv. What's it been like to follow Christ through the different seasons of your life?
 - v. 15 years ago, you underwent emergency triple bypass heart surgery. How did that effect your outlook on life?
 - vi. You recently lost your wife, Francis, of many years, after a long and difficult battle with Dementia
 - 1. What was that season like, as you cared for her every need, and she slipped away
 - 2. What did that do to your faith?
 - vii. What's it like being in the final years of your life?
 - viii. What does the closeness of death do to your perspective on things?
 - 1. How has your perspective on life and what's important changed over the years?
 - ix. What role does your relationship with Jesus play in your life now?
 - 1. How has your relationship with JC changed through the years?
 - x. How has the hope of life after death practically effected your life?
 - xi. What's helped you continue to follow and relate with Jesus over the long haul of your life?
 - xii. If you could give a word or two of encouragement or perspective to us today, most of us in our 20s and 30s, what would it be?
 - c. Hymn: The Love of God
 - i. Written 1917 (7 yrs before Al was born)
- 12. Because of God's great love for us, he has not been a good American and avoided conversation about life and death
- 13. The Bible's teaching is consistent start to finish about our lives:
 - a. Because of our sin and rebellion, this life is relatively brief
 - b. But Death is not the end

- c. God has moved HEAVEN AND EARTH to make a way for us to live AGAIN, to restore what was lost, and renew what was broken
 - i. Romans 6:5 \rightarrow Speaking about the effect of Jesus' death and resurrection for us
 - ii. "For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his."
 - iii. 1 Corinthians 15:53–55
 - iv. "For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality. ...then shall come to pass the saying that is written: 'Death is swallowed up in victory.' 'O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?'"
- d. Jesus came not only to offer us the forgiveness of our sins
 - i. BUT ALSO real, ETERNAL LIFE THAT STARTS NOW
 - ii. Reconnecting us to life, in every area, for the long haul!
- e. And for those who follow HIM, who TRUST IN HIM, they will literally and physically come back to life after they die → RESURRECTION!
 - i. Into a new PHYSICAL body that no longer is diseased by death and sickness and pain or sin
 - ii. INTO A RENEWED EARTH, real and physical, where heaven and earth finally merge,
 - 1. And God lives with us. Forever
 - iii. And we not only live in relationship with God, but also with ONE ANOTHER
 - 1. Reunited with others before us who have also trusted Jesus
- f. The life you've ALWAYS WANTED, the life you were MADE FOR
 - i. The home you've yearned for all your days
 - ii. The Garden is back, but magnified a billion times over
 - iii. We don't turn into angels, and float around in the clouds strumming harps
 - 1. That's nowhere in the Bible
- g. Instead, what's in store for us will be a restoration and an amplification of what we were made for! An embodied life in a physical world most likely THIS EARTH, renewed to a life that will quite familiar in many ways
 - i. Parties and fire pits
 - ii. Conversations that linger with friends
 - 1. None of the bad, and all of the good
 - 2. Relationships that remained broken finally able to work to FULL restoration

a. Healing!

- iii. Adventure, Innovation, Discovery
- iv. Even culture and art and society
 - 1. Human stuff. The stuff we were made for! But w/o the death, sin, and sadness
- h. The Real, Good, Life
- i. And I'll be there
 - i. Me
 - ii. And so will you, if you trust in Jesus
 - 1. In fact, it's been God's rescue plan from the beginning
 - iii. Job, likely the oldest book in the bible
 - 1. In ch 19, considering his own death, he remarks DO YOU CATCH IT?:
 - ²⁶ And after my skin has been destroyed,
 - yet^[e] in^[f] my flesh I will see God;
 - ²⁷ I myself will see him
 - with my own eyes—I, and not another.
 - How my heart yearns within me!
- j. There's real continuity between our lives is side of death and on the other
- k. It'll be ME, the real me. ME and no other.

- i. Even though my body will die
- ii. I'll see god, IN MY FLESH
- iii. I and no other
- I. Oh how I can say with Job that my heart yearns for this more and more with each passing year
- m. Since, then, we look to Jesus have a REAL HOPE of eternal life that starts now, and continues on thru death into resurrected, renewed life, we would be WISE to live our days accordingly
- n. To NUMBER OUR DAYS and live in wisdom
 - i. Not perfection, not under the weight of earning \rightarrow which is indeed the tyranny of death
 - ii. But instead in humble and grateful HOPE, because of what JESUS HAS ALREADY DONE FOR US, as one who was once blind, but now can see
 - iii. What is real, what matters, and how our days and words, and choices matter
- o. So that we can live lives of joyful, deeply peace-filled purpose, strengthened by vision of eternity, and empowered by the great and confident hope of resurrection
 - i. This vision is what will enable us to make progress in these many areas of relating
- p. So, in light of all this, Paul tells Timothy in 1 Tim 4: train yourself for godliness; ⁸ for while bodily training is of some value, godliness is of value in every way, as it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come.
- q. We can lean in
 - i. Big Kairos moments
 - 1. Special "the right time" moments where we seize the opportunity
 - ii. Small, seemingly insignificant choices to live and love and serve and give day in and day out
 - iii. Confident that these are training days
 - iv. And how we live NOW matters ... both now AND into eternity
 - 1. In light of the eternal life that is ours through Christ
 - 2. In light of the resurrection life to come
 - 3. We can engage with wisdom in each of these areas of relating we've talked about!
 - a. How would confidence in the resurrection affect how you relate to your family, neighbors?
 - b. Fellow Believers
 - i. Greater sense of urgency AND PATIENCE with people
 - ii. More commitment to the Church, since you know you'll be with these ppl for eternity!
 - c. Your sexuality
 - i. A much HIGHER view of your body, give you resolve to honor your body
 - d. Money?
 - i. Might seem simultaneously less and More important
 - ii. Less because you don't have to rely on money for life-security
 - iii. MORE because you realize how these are stewardship training days
 - v. These are TRAINING DAYS
 - 1. We're becoming who we'll be \rightarrow Who we REALLY ARE
- 14. ⁵ And he who was seated on the throne [JESUS] said, "Behold, I am making all things new." Rev 21:5
- 15. Be sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ. Phil 1:6
